## Why Palliative Care

There will be an estimated 40 per cent increase in deaths each year in Canada by 2020.

Ninety per cent of Canadians who die could have benefited from palliative care, but only one in four have access to palliative care.

The national strategy on end-of-life care outlines the importance of education/training and sharing best practices to ensure health care professionals are prepared to care for dying patients.

There is a need for Increased capacity throughout our health care system with more opportunities for increased research, better knowledge translation and consistent implementation of best practices. Also an improved education for health care providers and a health human resources plan to address future staffing is needed.

At the Freeman Centre for the Advancement of Palliative Care, we strive to:

- Nurture a culture of care that recognizes death as a natural part of life
- Respond to the reality that disease trajectories change
- Incorporate palliative care services sooner for those who have a life-threatening illness
- Provide patient- and family-centered end-oflife care

- 3. Ambulatory pain and symptom management clinics
- 4. In-home outreach program providing 24-hour access to Palliative Care Physicians.

#### Palliative Care Core Rotation

For: Family Practice Residents

**Duration**: 2 weeks

#### Residents will:

- Manage cancer pain
- Develop communication skills in challenging goals-of-care discussions and end-of-life care issues
- Become familiar with making a diagnosis of dying and providing end-of-life care to patients and families

#### **Mandatory Rotation Experience**

For: Medical Students

Duration: 1/2 day observership experience

#### Medical students will:

- Accompany an Advanced Practice Nurse (APN) on two home visits
- Observe approaches to symptom management, anticipatory guidance, caregiver support, liaison with community services and interaction with lay family caregivers

#### Clinical Palliative Care PGY3 Enhanced Skills Program - University of Toronto

**For**: Family Medicine Residents who wish to integrate palliative care into their future family practice

**Duration**: 6 months

#### Residents will:

- Gain experience in inpatient, outpatient and community/home-based palliative care
- Develop skills to practice palliative care at a primary and/or primary consultant level

#### Palliative Care Elective Rotation

For: Medical Students or Residents

Duration: 4 weeks (can be individualized)
